"Shortly after purchasing our home on the North side of Claiborne in 2012 we noticed our yard and street flooded after each rain event. Then only a couple of years later we discovered that our porch was separating from the roof on the same side of our house. However, it wasn't until we participated in the L9WHA Education Series with the Urban Conservancy that we learned about Green Infrastructure (GI) & that the lack of naturally occurring plants in this area of our yard was simultaneously causing flooding and subsidence —the real cause of our porch sinking.

While this was a lightbulb moment for us, we still didn't know what to do. So when the Waterwise GI 101 class & GI 102 tours were offered, we jumped at the opportunity to learn more. And it was from this class that we, along with other Lower 9 residents, suggested doing a Work & Learn, so that ALL residents of our community could learn how GI could salvage our homes.

It was a true pleasure to welcome the L9WHA, Waterwise Gulfsouth, 3 generations of Lower 9 residents & others to install a French drain, rain garden & naturally occurring plants to save our yard and our home! Our 4 year old daughter (pictured below) subsequently has invited all of the neighborhood kids to our yard to explain the GI that was installed and how it is impacting our house."


Community-Driven Revitalization

When Gaynell arrived at the L9WHA in 2020, her focal point was resident-driven revitalization with the vision to install green infrastructure (GI) at the home of every resident in the Lower 9th ward— a vital part of our Whole 9 Initiative. Therefore, **COMMUNITY-LED REVITALIZATION** at the L9WHA means partnering WITH the community to develop programs, events, and beautification initiatives that will empower others in the neighborhood to get involved. One example of this method in action is our GI work with WaterWise GulfSouth, Urban Conservancy, and SOUL. Each organization has partnered with the L9WHA to educate residents on the importance of GI and how it can help to reduce flooding in their yards after each rain event. We know that educating our residents will give them the knowledge needed to lead others. In 2022, we hosted workshops, hands-on learning events, and volunteer projects. And at our September 2022 green infrastructure class, one resident brought her entire block to attend the workshop.

Resident-Led Preservation—Ms. Cook's Story

The L9WHA prides itself on being a one-stop shop of homeownership resources for Lower 9 homeowners. However, we recognize the most valuable asset to our community-- is the people. Our office is always open to homeowners, like Ms. Cook, to call or visit when they need services or to share information with other homeowners.

Early in 2022 Ms. Cook contacted the L9WHA when she needed assistance with repairs. After receiving her services, Ms. Cook shared her success story with others in the community who are still fighting with insurance companies, and FEMA appeals post-Hurricane Ida. Then in June, Ms. Cook visited the L9WHA to provide us with information on the new roof installation program provided by Rebuilding Together, a non-profit Organization in New Orleans. Our Client Services Specialist, Ms. Cynthia, contacted Rebuilding Together to verify the documentation needed to apply to the program and shared the information with homeowners in the community who she knew met their qualifications. To date, 6 residents have received new roofs via the L9WHA and Ms. Cook.

Things we look forward to in 2023

In 2023, after listening to our homeowners and conducting an assessment of current client services, we are expanding our services to include resources and funding for repairs. This will only strengthen our preservation work as we continue our work with successions, estate planning, disaster recovery (FEMA & insurance appeals), and lot abatement.

The First Annual Lower 9 Festival

The L9WHA and Lower 9 Neighborhood Association have worked together to bring programs and events to the Community since the beginning of their partnership in 2019. In 2021, they combined efforts to develop a community resource fair for their neighborhood that was supposed to take place on the anniversary of Hurricane Katrina (2005). However, on August 29, 2021, Hurricane Ida hit Louisiana. Homes and businesses were damaged, but the community remained resilient. As such, this year we worked with L9NA to host an even bigger event. On August 27, 2022, staff

members and volunteers reported to Oliver Bush Playground. We set up the Lower 9 Fest and waited for the kick-off. By 11:00am, the sky opened up, and it rained heavily for over an hour. In spite of the rain, participants and organizations continued to arrive for this inaugural event. We proceeded with the festival plan, and the event was a MASSIVE success.

The L9WHA and L9NA's 1st Annual Lower 9 Festival kicked off with a traditional New Orleans secondline led by the Stooges Brass Band, 2022 King and Queen of Zulu, elected officials, and community leaders. The festival featured live music performances by local musicians, food trucks, kids activities, and a 50+ organization community resource area. **See the inset for more photos from the Lower 9 Festival.
